

Goldwater, along with Maurice Coyne and Louis Silberkleit, founded MLJ Magazines in 1939.

But it wouldn't be until Winter 1942, which is the date on the first "Archie" issue, which started with issue #114, that the gang (Archie, Veronica Lodge; Betty Cooper, Reggie Mantle and Jughead Jones) would become a full-fledge comic and the company's breakout publication, eventually lead to the company changing to Archie Comics.



The Classics Revisited

Robinson Crusoe

Daniel Defoe's Robinson Crusoe made me consider a question I had never asked before. What would I do if I found myself marooned and all alone for over 28 years on a deserted island?

I'm not sure about you but the mere thought makes me weak in the knees and positive that I wouldn't have been as successful at surviving as Robinson Crusoe.

Set in the 1600's, Defoe's inspiration for the book is said to have been attributed to numerous sources chronicling the accounts of real life people and their experiences as castaways around this time.

Defoe, English trader, writer and spy, was exposed to many adventures himself, his excursions, and the people he met along the way, helping to lay the foundation for his character.

A young and impulsive wanderer, Crusoe defies his parents and goes to sea, exposing himself to numerous dangerous encounters. After being shipwrecked twice, captured by pirates, enslaved by Moors, escaping then becoming a slave trader and wealthy plantation owner, he pushes his luck once too often, joining an expedition bringing slaves from Africa, which finds him shipwrecked on a seemingly deserted island in the Caribbean.

The ensuing story is one of extraordinary resourcefulness and ingenuity. Crusoe, salvaging what he could from the wrecked ship, creates his own kingdom complete with a self-perpetuating food supply and practically impregnable fortress.

Spending over twenty five years on the island he thought was completely deserted; he realizes it is periodically visited by cannibals participating in victory rituals with rival tribes where they consume their conquered adversaries.

Crusoe manages to rescue an intended victim and molds him into his trusted man-servant, Friday.

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The remaining story chronicles Crusoe's eventual escape and financial recovery from his earlier adventures. Although necessary to tie up the loose ends, in my opinion this part of the novel is much more tedious than the previous portion.

Overall I found this book intriguing. Crusoe's ability to master his fate, overcoming some of the harshest natural conditions while at the same time questioning his principles in the midst of possible capture and execution; is incredibly admirable.

Crusoe's experiences also constitutes a moral struggle, contrasting the right and wrong way to live one's life and the importance of self awareness, introspection and gratitude for God's grace or as he puts it "God's Providence."

Robinson Crusoe marked the beginning of realistic fiction as a literary genre. Its success impacting literature with many similar type adventures following. The book is one of the most widely published in history, spawning numerous sequels along with adaptations for stage, film and television.
